Newton Parish Council

The Annual Parish Assembly is to be held on Monday 9th March at 7pm in the Village Hall. This is open to all parish electors who are invited to attend to discuss any queries. The Councillors will do their best to answer any concerns.

Street Lighting - Cambridgeshire County Council has arranged an audit of street lighting throughout Cambridgeshire. Many parishes are responsible for their own street light maintenance, Newton falls within this category.

Fenland District Council (FDC) is at present negotiating to fund street lighting in Category 1, the most urgent repairs, amounting to two lights in our Parish, whilst Category 2 consists of 11 street lights in our Parish in need of replacement within the next three years. The total estimated cost for the 11 lights would amount to £13,200. FDC are again looking into the possible funding of part of the total cost leaving the Parish Council to pay the remainder, likely to exceed £9,000 over three years.

At this time, decisions have not as yet been finalised on any of the lighting costs, however our Parish Council does have to make sure that they have enough funding in place to start the process. The Precept for Newton is now due to be set and these estimated costs along with an increase in the general running costs have to be considered, leaving the Parish no other choice but to increase the Precept.

Newton Village Gardening Club

Over 30 members attended our meeting in November to listen to a very interesting talk on Orchid Growing for beginners by David Morgan, the Chairman of the British Orchid Growers Society, telling us about the correct way of growing them, the best place to site them, potting up, and feeding them, punctuated with anecdotes from his horticultural experiences. Dee Markham and Julia Hill organised the refreshments.

The final meeting of the year on the 13th December was the club's annual Christmas party. We decided to do something different, instead of the usual sit down meal. This year we had a bring and share buffet with entertainment from local barbershop quartet 'Double Take'. Doug Fullbrook's homemade beer and wine was also on offer for anyone who wanted it. The evening was enjoyed by all.

Neighbourhood Watch

Could you become the eyes and ears of your community?

We need more volunteers to become co-ordinators of Neighbourhood Watch in all areas of Wisbech town and rural villages such as Newton. Co-ordinators are invaluable to police as they pass information from police to their neighbours and vice versa. Imagine there has been a burglary or vehicle crime in your street; wouldn't you want to be aware? By knowing, you can put crime prevention methods in place to help protect yours and your neighbours' property.

Neighbourhood Watch is not just about watching out and ensuring possible crimes and incidents are reported effectively to the police, but it is also about looking out for your neighbours by keeping an eye on those most vulnerable people in the community.

Your scheme in Newton could be all the houses in the street where you live or just a few houses around you - schemes can run successfully with as few as 5 houses. Access to email is required as all our messages are sent out this way.
